STRATEGIES FOR THE JUDICIARY

The Louisiana Supreme Court 2000

A wealth of information about the performance of our state courts is found in Justice at Work: The State of Judicial Performance in Louisiana.

The report, published annually, is distributed statewide to media, legislators and civic organizations.

n a busy and productive first year of the 21st century, we approved strategic plans for the Supreme Court, the Courts of Appeal and the District Courts. Included in the Supreme Court plan are initiatives that support families, increase outreach and improve court effectiveness. We expanded our successful Ride-

Along Program and our Community Relations Department was recognized with an award by the Press Club of New Orleans for the 1999 Annual Report. And we began several new programs.

A longstanding goal of the Court has been reducing the number of attorney disciplinary infractions; we made progress on several fronts in 2000. The Committee to Study Permanent Disbarment, co-chaired by Justices Catherine "Kitty" Kimball and Jeannette T. Knoll, recommended that disbarment in the most egregious of lawyer discipline cases be permanent. The Louisiana State Bar Association (LSBA) House of Delegates endorsed the concept, and the Court should act on the report in 2001.

Professionalism orientations for new law students, sponsored by the LSBA, were introduced at the four Louisiana law schools in the fall, upon the recommendation of the Committee on the Prevention of Lawyer Misconduct, chaired by Justice Chet D. Traylor. Judges from several state courts, including Supreme Court Justices Harry T. Lemmon, Chet D. Traylor and myself, participated in the well-received sessions. Acting on another recommendation from this committee, the Court increased the passing score on the Multi-State Professional Responsibility Exam (MPRE) from 75 to 80. We have also established an Ad Hoc Committee to Study Potential Changes in the Admission and Practice of Law. The group, established following a recommendation of the LSBA, is charged with developing new ways to provide guidance for young attorneys, including whether to require an internship or apprenticeship for admission to the Louisiana bar.

Administrative improvements outlined in recently adopted five-year strategic plans – for the Supreme Court and lower courts – began to be implemented this year. The Court's Committee to Study Judicial Leave and Attorney Appointments in Limited and Specialized Jurisdiction Courts, chaired by Justice Bernette Johnson, also continued its study of how attorneys are appointed to sit as judges *ad hoc* or *pro tempore*.

A wealth of information about the performance of our state courts is found in *Justice at Work: The State of Judicial Performance in Louisiana*, a report published in accordance with the Judicial Budget and Performance Accountability Act of 1999 by the Judicial Administrator of the Supreme Court. The yearly report is distributed statewide to media, legislators and civic organizations.

Streamlining and making more uniform the rules of the district courts statewide has been a topic of study for four years by the LSBA and the Supreme Court. After much work, the members of the joint Court Rules Committee presented a very impressive draft of uniform district court rules to the Bar Association in June; the Court expects to hear from the Committee early in 2001.

One of the Court's most potentially farreaching reform initiatives in 2000 was the establishment of an *Ad Hoc* Committee to Study the Creation of a Judicial Campaign Oversight Committee. Retired Judge Graydon Kitchens, Jr., former chairman of the Judiciary Commission, and I co-chair the 21-member committee.

The initiative grew from the Court's and my personal observations (after four campaigns) of the increasingly combative and perhaps unethical nature of judicial campaigns. Unfortunately, ugly campaigns seem more the rule than the exception.

Several states have instituted a judicial campaign oversight system as a mechanism for educating candidates and monitoring campaign conduct. Such a committee could be both a resource and a deterrent. It would educate candidates about the Code of Judicial Conduct, for example, answer ethical questions that arise during an election campaign on an expedited basis, and

review actual or proposed campaign conduct and ads. The Committee could also deter unethical conduct by soliciting from each candidate a pledge of ethical campaign conduct, reviewing complaints and taking appropriate (and timely) action.

The *ad hoc* committee will explore appropriate enforcement authority for the Oversight Committee. Of course, such a committee will not interfere with the authority and responsibilities of the Judiciary Commission.

Committee members include six sitting judges from several court levels. The group held a public hearing in November to gather comments on a preliminary proposal; it should present recommendations to the Supreme Court in 2001.

This year, we bid a fond farewell to Justice Walter F. Marcus, Jr., of New Orleans, who retired in September after nearly 28 years on the Supreme Court Bench, and we were saddened by the death of retired Justice Pike Hall of Shreveport in November.

I have the distinct privilege of submitting to the Supreme Court of Louisiana, to the Board of Governors of the Louisiana State Bar Association, to the citizens of Louisiana, and to other interested parties the Annual Report of the Supreme Court of Louisiana for 2000, including the reports of the Judicial Council, the Judicial Administrator's Office, the Clerk of Court, the Law Library of Louisiana, the Louisiana Judicial College, and the Judiciary Commission of Louisiana, as well as statistical information on the state judiciary reflecting the work of the past year. The report also includes information from the Bar Admissions Committee and the Louisiana Attorney Disciplinary Board, entities that operate under the auspices of the Supreme Court. I congratulate all who were involved in our efforts in 2000.

Several states, including Alabama, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, Obio. MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN A NEW MILLENNIUM

The Judicial Administrator's Office

he Judicial Administrator's Office is the managerial arm of the Louisiana Supreme Court, serving as fiscal agent and staffing the Judicial Council and numerous court-appointed task forces and committees. The scope and services of the office have broadened with the innovations and reforms instituted by the Louisiana Supreme Court. In 2000, the office and its staff maintained a dual focus on managing the Court's operations effectively and reaching out with initiatives that have an impact on the daily lives of citizens far beyond the walls of Court chambers. Significant accomplishments are detailed in the following report; in the coming year, we hope to base further initiatives on these successes.

In one particularly important effort, we have focused on ensuring that persons with disabilities have equal access to all areas and programs of the judicial system. As part of the project, the Human Resources Department of the Judicial Administrator's Office prepared a reference handbook designed to guide district and appellate courts in complying with the statutory requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act. The handbook, Equal Access to Justice, was distributed to state court judges and court administrators. It includes accessibility checklists and selfevaluation work sheets that should help each of us develop a better awareness of the ways in which we can make the courts more accessible to all of us.

It's important that citizens – through the media, government representatives and civic organizations – have information about the effectiveness of the court system in the state. To that end, we published *Justice at Work: The State of Judicial Performance in Louisiana*. The annual publication, required by a new law, will outline our strategic plans – and their implementation – as we strive for effective, user-friendly court performance.

We continue to adapt technology, developing new ways to make sure that protective orders actually protect the people who most need it. We rely on consistent community relations outreach. And we are strong in our commitment to a brighter future for the children and families of Louisiana through our extensive, innovative Juvenile Justice programs.

2000: A YEAR IN REVIEW

Judicial Council & Judicial Administrator's Office

n 2000, within the scope of the strategic plan, key initiatives of the Judicial Council & Judicial Administrator's Office focused on preventing family violence through improving the Louisiana Protective Order Registry, reaching out to the community with information about the state of judicial performance in



Louisiana, planning for Web site improvements that will disseminate a broad menu of information in a user-friendly way, and strengthening ADA compliance and staff management techniques through human resources innovations.

STRATEGIC PLANNING & COURT PERFORMANCE

The first annual report on Justice at Work: The State of Judicial Performance in Louisiana was prepared and published by the Judicial Administrator's Office in 2000, pursuant to the provisions of the Judicial Budget and Performance Accountability Act of 1999.

The report outlines the activities of the various courts to improve their performance. It includes:

- A brief description of the ways courts plan to improve their performance, based on their respective strategic plans.
- A detailed analysis of the Supreme Court's progress in creating a datagathering system to provide additional measures of performance.

- A description of the uniform reporting standards used to guide the development of the data-gathering system.
- An analysis of the barriers confronted by the courts in establishing the datagathering system.

In 2000, all levels of courts reported significant improvements in technology, including Local Area Network (LAN) systems, automated case management systems and real-time court reporting. Trial courts expended considerable effort in the establishment of drug courts, better jury management and employee training.

The picture that emerges is one of an active court system at every level, dedicated to improving performance and client service.

Anthony J. Gagliano Deputy Judicial Administrator Supreme Court of Louisiana Strategic planning is a key element in assuring continual performance improvement. The Supreme Court adopted strategic plans on behalf of itself, the courts of appeal and the trial courts, covering the period from January 1, 2000 through December 31, 2004.

The strategic plans serve three purposes:

- They provide assistance and guidance to all courts within Louisiana for the continuous improvement of the judiciary and the practice of law.
- They serve as both affirmations and practical tools for public accountability by demonstrating to the public the judiciary's values, goals, objectives and strategies for the future, as well as its unwavering commitment to the improvement of judicial performance.
- They establish a stronger framework for dialogue between the judiciary and the executive and legislative branches on the budgetary and other needs of the courts and on performance budgeting.

Each of the plans contains goals and objectives based on the national appellate and trial court performance standards as revised by the Louisiana Appellate Court Performance Standards Commission and the Louisiana Trial Court Performance Standards Commission and adopted by the Supreme Court of Louisiana in 1997.

Most goals and objectives express enduring values that are not likely to change. The strategies, on the other hand, are tools that can change and be adapted over time to address new problems, new realities, new technologies, and new understanding of better ways to shape the future of the courts.

The strategic plans are available by contacting the Office of the Judicial Administrator.

LOUISIANA PROTECTIVE ORDER REGISTRY

A centralized statewide computer repository, the Louisiana Protective Order Registry collects civil and criminal protective orders, which provide relief from abuse or harassment by a spouse, intimate partner or family member. The registry has become a national leader for

its effectiveness. Among its accomplishments in 2000:

- District courts in all 64 parishes used the required Louisiana Uniform Abuse Prevention Order forms to transmit orders to the registry. In addition, one family court, four juvenile courts, two parish courts and eight city or municipal courts used the standardized forms.
- A total of 13,792 orders were entered in the database in 2000, more than half the total of 24,411 in the last three years. Of these orders, 6,017 remain active.
- About two-thirds of 2000's orders were civil (temporary restraining orders, which accounted for almost half the civil order total; protective orders, preliminary or permanent injunctions).
 Criminal stay-away orders consisted primarily of bail restrictions and peace bonds.
- Almost 6,000 of the orders were transmitted to national database files. The defendant in about half of these had at least one prior felony arrest. The Louisiana database also is used by the National Instant Check System, which approves firearms purchase applications. If an applicant is the subject of an active protection order, the firearms purchase application is denied.
- Usage of the registry continues to increase. Average daily searches by law enforcement officials rose from a low of 2,607 in January to a high of 3,300 in November. In December, about 10% of the searches came back with a positive result, compared to 4% in January.
- The Louisiana registry is a national model. During 2000, staff and consultants conducted seven regional seminars, nine interactive software training programs, and 10 workshops attended by a total of 1,056 participants including judges, clerks of court, other court personnel, prosecutors, law enforcement officers, victim advocates and attorneys. The State of Georgia has chosen the Louisiana registry as its model; staff presented the registry to participants at the first national conference on state protection order registries held in November in Newport Beach, CA.

JUDICIAL OUTREACH

The Internet has become a primary tool in the Supreme Court's ability to reach out to all constituencies. Thus web site improvement planning of the Court's web site (www.lasc.org) is a focus of the Community Relations Department working together with the Court's Web Site Committee. The upgrade will include information on the schedule and status of all cases before the Court, as well as keyword search engines and other user-friendly systems for expanding the public's use of the site to gain access to Court opinions, orders, rules and other decisions in a timely and effective manner. The new site, with a new look, is scheduled for launch during 2001.

In addition to spearheading web site renovations, the Community Relations Department gained kudos for its Courting Louisiana Students and Schools (CLASS) program. In the project, oral arguments are taped and aired to schools throughout the state, accompanied by a handbook for teachers and curriculum planners. Through an Internet lesson plan, students write their own opinions and then compare them with the Court's official decisions in the cases.

"Ride-Alongs" continued to give opinion leaders opportunities for first-hand observation in the courtroom, expanding this year to include the Supreme Court. And "Law School for Journalists" helped members of the press who report on the courts throughout the state improve their skills.

The 1999 Annual Report of the Louisiana Supreme Court was chosen by the Press Club of Louisiana for an award for publications excellence.

Human Resources

Employees are at the heart of the Louisiana Supreme Court and, indeed, the court system throughout the state. The Human Resources Department of the Judicial Administrator's Office continues to pursue consistent policies and procedures to support strategic planning and performance standards. Among the activities during 2000:

 Using checklists developed by office staff, audited the Supreme Court for accessibility to persons with disabilities.

- Providing "disability awareness training" for court employees with regular direct public contact.
- Conducting 14 refresher training sessions for employees and management on sexual harassment awareness and prevention.
- Developing recommendations to adopt several new rules and policies for the Supreme Court and Courts of Appeal, including new compensatory leave policies for the appellate court system.
- Carrying out pay and classification studies, and making recommendations concerning security, legal support and attorney positions in the Supreme Court and Courts of Appeal.
- Recommending the establishment of new jobs and reclassification of other positions.
- Continuing to serve as consultants to judges and other court administrators by regularly responding to requests for assistance ranging from answering a question or providing advice concerning a human resource matter to assisting with recruitment efforts by writing ads or designing a selection process complete with recruitment options, interview guidelines, questionnaires, job specifications and ADA essential functions.
- Ensuring the continued integrity and competitiveness of the uniform judicial pay plan by continually surveying courts nationwide for salary information for jobs similar to those in the Louisiana system and reviewing other state and local salary data.

CHILDREN & FAMILIES

The Court continues to focus on and improve the justice system for families and children in the state. In 2000, initiatives included:

- The Louisiana Court Improvement Program, a federally funded program for improving the adjudication of child abuse and neglect cases in the state and for collaborating with other areas of government and the private sector, ensures that abused and neglected children are provided permanent and safe homes as quickly as possible.
- Families in Need of Services (FINS)
 Assistance Program, under which the

Judicial Administrator's Office manages the funds provided by the legislature to assist local FINS processes. A sort of pre-delinquency intervention, FINS provides interagency social work services to assist children and families, often signing contracts for school and family progress in lieu of court adjudication. The FINS Assistance Program has developed a needs-based allocation formula, a uniform data system for tracking, managing and reporting FINS informal cases, programmatic standards, performance indicators and measures, and periodic fiscal reports.

- The Campaign for the Children, a public awareness project focused on the problem of foster care drift and encouraging greater support for foster children.
- The New Orleans Collaborative for Timely Adoptions, a grant designed to assist the Orleans Parish Juvenile Court in reducing delays in child abuse and neglect cases and in instituting system reforms, including the development of the Integrated Juvenile Justice Information System.

NEW JUDGESHIPS


The Judicial Council's Committee to Evaluate Requests for the Creation of New Judgeships, chaired by Judge Charles R. Scott, investigates and evaluates requests

for new judgeships prior to consideration by the legislature. This evaluation takes the creation of new judgeships out of the political arena, contains costs, and provides an objective system for determining the need for new judgeships. Before making recommendations, judges who are members of the committee, along with staff from the Judicial Administrator's office, conduct site visits, examine records, interview members of the court and the legal community in the area, and study the filing statistics of the requesting courts. In 2000, eight new judgeships were requested. Following consideration of the Committee's recommendations, the Judicial Council recommended six new judgeships—one for each of the following courts: Third Judicial District, Seventeenth Judicial District, Nineteenth Judicial District, Twenty-Second Judicial District, Thirtieth Judicial District, Thirty-Third **Judicial District.**

JUDICIAL BUDGET


Louisiana does not have a unified state court funding system. The operations of district, parish and city courts are primarily funded by local governments in Louisiana. An annual legislative appropriation funds the operations of the Louisiana Supreme Court and the five circuit courts of appeal, as well as the salaries of Supreme Court justices, the salaries of the judges of the courts of appeal, and the salaries of the judges of the district courts, including family and juvenile courts. Also funded by the state is a portion of the salaries of the judges of the parish and city courts, the compensation of retired judges and ad hoc judges serving on a Louisiana bench on a temporary basis, and the pensions of the surviving spouses of justices and judges. The Judicial Budgetary Control Board, created in 1977 to establish rules and regulations to govern the expenditures of all funds appropriated by the legislature to the judiciary, presents a budget request to the Louisiana Supreme Court for approval prior to each legislative session. The Louisiana Supreme Court, in turn, presents the request to the Louisiana Legislature. In 2000, 0.5% of the state's general fund was appropriated to defray the expenses of the state judiciary.

MANAGING KNOWLEDGE

The Law Library of Louisiana



he end of the millennium marked 30 years since the Law Library of Louisiana hired its first professional librarian as director. Those three decades have brought unprecedented change in management and accessibility of legal information.

In perhaps the most symbolic change, the Library closed down its traditional card catalog on Halloween, 2000, with a festive funeral party.

The electronic catalog had gone up on the Internet, giving the Louisiana legal community and other citizens across the world the ability to see what is in the collection. Janice Shull, formally recognized as head of technical services in December, earned tremendous applause for masterminding the year-long effort.

Due to space considerations, the library is gradually replacing hard-copy versions of resources with electronic access. And a flat-rate Lexis contract saved more than \$16,000 over 1999's legal research costs.

"Public service" librarians, Marie Erickson and Catherine Lemann, continue to employ their expertise as lawyers and computer researchers to locate information for users – and teach them how to mine electronic resources for themselves.

Catherine Lemann, who was named associate director of the library in April, continues to serve as the Court's de facto Webmaster, posting all Supreme Court opinions, rule changes and press releases

on the Court's Internet site (www.lasc.org).

Carol Billings became director of the Library 20 years ago, succeeding Harriet Lemann, the first librarian/director who, in 10 years, cataloged a collection, which had been accumulating since 1855.

In 20 years, the library has grown dramatically, from 104,000 volumes in paper and 3,000 in microformat to 150,000 in paper and 67,000 in microformat. The total budget has increased by a factor of five.

The staff continues leadership roles in professional activities – Catherine Lemann is president of the Southeastern Chapter of the American Association of Law Libraries, Marie Erickson is immediate past-president of the New Orleans Association of Law Libraries and Georgia Chadwick is president-elect.

A National Endowment for the Humanities grant brought a preservation expert to evaluate the condition of the library's old and rare books and recommend measures for their care. Staffers also hosted the national meeting of state and federal court historical societies.

And after 20 years of service, library associate Diane "D.D." Thompson has retired.



he Office of the Clerk of Court received 3,565 filings in 2000, the second-highest on record. The office admitted 575 new attorneys. The 3,858 certificates of good standing requested by and prepared for attorneys increased by about 10%, marking the second record-breaking year in a row.

Ben Bourgeois Director of Security The Office of the Clerk of Court has 50 full and part-time staff. Its duties include accepting and preparing all pleadings for consideration by the Court.

The office is responsible for accurate data entry of all filings into the Court Information Management System, a computer software system especially designed for case filings. Its staff also manages and supports information systems for the justices and their staff, the Central and Civil legal staffs, four satellite justices' offices and the Law Library. In 2000, it issued laptop computers to Supreme Court justices.

Clerk's office staff members are hosts for court visitors, dispensing information and directing them to the various offices in the Supreme Court Building. Security staff members are aided by a state-of-theart, computer-enhanced security system. The Clerk of Court also operates an inhouse microfilming section, a job previously performed by the State Archives. More than 600,000 documents were microfilmed as part of our records retention/space reduction project; we recycle an average of two tons of paper a week.

The business services department handles the purchasing, accounts payable and receivables for the Court, as well as maintaining personnel records. The office also manages a property inventory of 900 items valued at over \$1.2 million.

The renovations of 400 Royal Street into offices for the Supreme Court and its affiliates are continuing, with progress overseen by the Clerk of Court. All but the final touches on the exterior site work have been completed. The contract for the final phase of construction is scheduled for spring, 2001, with a completion date in late 2002.

EMPHASIZING CHARACTER & ETHICS

Committee on Bar Admissions

ach year, about 1,000 potential lawyers take the state bar examination seeking licensure to practice law in Louisiana. In 2000, bar examinations were administered during the week of February 14th and the week of July 24th, with respective pass rates of 66% and 69%. Some 584 new attorneys were admitted to practice.

The examination is conducted by the Committee on Bar Admissions, comprised of 15 active members of the Louisiana State Bar Association (LSBA) appointed by the Louisiana Supreme Court. Committee members may serve two consecutive five-year terms. In addition to the Committee members, 450 volunteer attorneys serve the Court as assistant examiners in the examination and admissions process.

CHANGES IN THE PROCESS

During 2000, the procedures governing admission to the Bar underwent substantial changes. The Committee presented and the Court approved the procedures for failing applicants to review their exam papers and representative good answers. Based on the success of the initial review, the court extended the procedure through July 2001.

Many law students enrolled in Louisiana ABA-approved law schools have taken advantage of the National Conference of Bar Examiners law student registration program. The Committee continues to encourage law students to enroll in the program so that the character and background investigation can be completed as a prerequisite to taking the bar examination.

The Committee has developed comprehensive guidelines for granting applicants testing accommodations in accordance with Americans with Disabilities Act.

2000 Exam Results

In 2000, the Committee administered exams during the weeks of February 14 and July 24. The passage rates were 66% for the February exam and 69% for the July exam.

Justice Chet D. Traylor presided at ceremonies on April 20 when 186 new attorneys were admitted to the Bar; Justice Jeannette T. Knoll did the honors on October 6, when 398 new attorneys were admitted.

REGULATING THE Practice of Law

Louisiana Attorney Disciplinary Board

he year 2000 continued to reflect the Louisiana Supreme Court's commitment to a more exacting regulation of the practice of law. The Court's 1990 decision to embrace the American Bar Association's Model Rules for Disciplinary Enforcement, a first for any state in the country, continues to pay dividends as Louisiana is viewed as a model by attorney regulatory agencies in other states.

The Disciplinary Board's Office of Disciplinary Counsel received 3,243 complaints during the year. After screening out matters falling outside the Board's jurisdiction, and referring 216 matters to the Louisiana State Bar Association's Diversion Programs, investigations were launched into 2,113 complaints.

The aggressive pursuit of attorneys alleged to have violated the ethical rules in Louisiana resulted in a markedly increased caseload for the disciplinary agency and the Louisiana Supreme Court. By December 31, 2000, the Office of Disciplinary Counsel had initiated 153 prosecutions reflecting 360 underlying complaints – a 400% rise in the rate of prosecution since 1995. The Court issued more than 80 discipline-related orders in 2000. Nineteen orders called for disbarment; 41 ordered periods of suspension.

This remarkable increase in productivity has been accompanied by a dramatic decrease in the time required to investigate allegations of attorney misconduct. Historically, the investigative process took

18 to 24 months. Now the disciplinary agency has successfully maintained 80% of its investigative files at six months or less and nearly 90% at less than a year.

Those areas of attorney misconduct most harmful to the profession have become the focus of the disciplinary agency. A carefully crafted plan to combat runner-based solicitation, launched nearly three years ago, has resulted in a major reduction in this unethical and illegal activity. More than a dozen disciplinary actions have been imposed for solicitation, a dramatic increase. Commingling and conversion of client and third-party funds, conflicts of interest and other areas of attorney misconduct continue to be investigated and, where appropriate, prosecuted.

With nearly 18,500 lawyers licensed to practice in Louisiana, the Supreme Court and the Louisiana Attorney Disciplinary Board recognize that their commitment to a firm but fair system of lawyer regulation is essential to improving the ethical and professional standards which govern the legal profession.

THE JUDICIARY COMMISSION OF LOUISIANA

he Judiciary Commission of Louisiana is a nine-member constitutional body, empowered to review allegations of judicial misconduct and to recommend to the Supreme Court that a judge be sanctioned when misconduct is proven by clear and convincing evidence.

In addition to their review of complaints about judicial behavior, the Commission members endeavor to inform the judiciary about proper applications of the Canons of the Code of Judicial Conduct and the ethical limitations placed upon judges, both professionally and personally. Commission members serve without pay but receive reimbursement for expenses incurred in attending to Commission business. Its members also act as case managers who attend status conferences and other meetings in connection with cases before the Commission. During 2000, the Commission convened nine meetings, requiring 11 days of business.

POWERS

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may censure, suspend with or without salary, remove from office, or involuntarily retire a judge. Sanctionable offenses include willful misconduct relating to his or her official duty, willful and persistent failure



to perform his or her duty, persistent and public conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice that brings the judicial office into disrepute, and conduct while in office which would constitute a felony or conviction of a felony.

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may disqualify a judge from exercising any judicial function, without loss of salary, during pendency of disciplinary proceedings in the Supreme Court.

On recommendation of the Judiciary Commission, the Supreme Court may involuntarily retire a judge for disability that seriously interferes with the performance of his or her duties and that is or is likely to become permanent.

The Commission's jurisdiction includes justices and judges of all courts of this state, including commissioners, magistrates, justices of the peace, referees, special masters, judicially appointed hearing officers, and mayors who perform judicial functions.

All documents filed, all evidence and all proceedings before the Commission are confidential.

The record filed by the Commission with the Supreme Court and proceedings before the Supreme Court are not confidential.



The Judiciary Commission of Louisiana, created in 1968 by an amendment to Article IX, Constitution of 1921, is continued in existence by Article V, Section 25, Constitution of 1974.

2000 ACTIVITY

The Judiciary Commission of Louisiana received and docketed 479 complaints against judges and justices of the peace in 2000. In addition, 120 complaints filed prior to 2000 were pending January 1, 2000.

Complaints are received from litigants, non-litigant citizens, attorneys, judges, non-judicial state/parish/city employees, non-judicial public officials and anonymous sources. Some complaints are referred to the Commission by the Attorney Disciplinary Board, and the Commission is authorized to review matters on its own motion, which may come from media reports of alleged judicial misconduct.

In 2000, the Commission's Office of Special Counsel received some 694 requests for information, and the Commission Office received some 219 requests.

Of the 479 complaints filed and docketed in 2000, 292 were screened out as not within the jurisdiction of the Commission, or without merit or sufficient corroborating evidence. The remaining 187 cases were reviewed to consider the need for investigation. Thirty-three of the 187 cases required indepth investigation.

In 2000, the Commission filed 20 formal charges against 10 judges. One judge resigned after the filing of formal charges, a second judge resigned during a hearing on formal charges, and a third judge, against whom formal charges were filed in 1999, resigned after a hearing on the charges. Five matters in which formal charges were filed - all but one filed before 2000 - were resolved privately before the Commission. Formal hearings were conducted in four other cases. In one case, the Commission dismissed the formal charges after the hearing. Further, the Commission conducted one proceeding required by the Louisiana Code of Evidence in connection with a subpoena for attorney records. There are no cases currently pending after hearing upon formal charges before the Commission.

In 2000, after formal hearings, including hearings convened in 1999, the

Commission submitted to the Supreme Court recommendations for discipline in two cases.

Also, during 2000, nine judges made voluntary appearances for questioning by the Commission.

The Supreme Court removed one judge from office, issued two public censures and declined to impose discipline in another case. In addition, the Supreme Court also ordered the Secretary of State to remove the name of a former judge from the ballot. The candidate had previously been removed from judicial office and he then qualified and became a candidate for the remaining unexpired current term of the same judicial office from which he was removed.

As of December 31, 2000, there are no matters pending before the Supreme Court.

The Commission had 109 cases pending as of December 31, 2000, having disposed of 490 cases in 2000.

CONFIDENTIALITY

In accordance with Rule XXIII, Section 23 of the Rules of the Supreme Court, all documents filed, all evidence and all proceedings before the Commission are confidential unless and until the Commission files a recommendation for discipline or retirement with the Supreme Court. The record filed by the Commission with the Supreme Court and proceedings before the Supreme Court are not confidential. Once a recommendation is filed with the Supreme Court, it becomes public as is any case before the Court.

COMPLAINTS

Complaints may be made to the office of the Chief Executive Officer of the Commission, Hugh M. Collins, Ph.D., 1555 Poydras Street, Suite 1540, New Orleans, LA 70112, telephone (504) 568-5747. Complaints should be in writing and should allege judicial misconduct. Dissatisfaction with legal rulings, absent judicial misconduct, should be addressed through appeal. The Commission is not empowered to change a judicial ruling of any kind.

STATISTICAL OVERVIEW

he statistical information in this section was compiled from data submitted to the Judicial Administrator's Office by the various courts of Louisiana during the calendar year 2000.

SUPREME COURT

In 2000, there were 3,565 filings in the Supreme Court. The filings in 2000 were 2.4% lower than in 1999.

COURTS OF APPEAL

In 2000, there were 10,680 filings in the Louisiana courts of appeal. This represents an increase of approximately 37% over the filings 10 years earlier. The 2000 filings were 3.9% lower than in 1999. The average time interval from the filing of a civil appeal to its disposition was 383 days in the First Circuit, 224 days in the Second Circuit, 188 days in the Third Circuit, 318 days in the Fourth Circuit, and 192 days in the Fifth Circuit. The average time interval from the filing of a criminal appeal to its disposition was 319 days in the First Circuit, 213 days in the Second Circuit, 212 days in the Third Circuit, 383 days in the Fourth Circuit, and 189 days in the Fifth Circuit.

DISTRICT COURTS

During 2000, there were 166,862 civil filings in the district courts, a decrease of 0.7% when compared with 1999. During 2000, there were 501,815 criminal and traffic filings in the district courts, an increase of 4.3% over 1999. Civil jury trials decreased by 3.1% when compared with 1999 and criminal jury trials decreased by 16.0% when compared with 1999.

CITY AND PARISH COURTS


Filings in Louisiana city and parish courts increased by 2.0% from 1,031,433 filings in 1999 to 1,052,482 filings in 2000.





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LOUISIANA DISTRICT COURTS JUDICIAL DISTRICTS




LOUISIANA COURTS OF APPEAL CIRCUITS




